Dear Students, Parents and Friends,

I hope that this newsletter finds our community well. This week our students finished their internal exams, so I am sure that they are happy and relieved. Of course, our Year 4 and 6 students continue on with their IGCSE and IBDP exams, and so have to wait a couple of weeks more until they can relax. I would like to thank the PSP and all parents who have helped to support our students over this exam period, particularly those who helped and contributed to the Study Nights on Tuesdays and Thursdays.

Thank you very much to all parents who responded to the Mobile Phone Policy survey. In total there were 629 responses, which represents about two thirds of our parents. Responses were received from across all year levels in the school with responses showed a wide range of views phones in school, including those advocating for a total ban and those who believe that they are a necessary tool for modern education and life.

The data highlights that 99% of students have their own phone, with 98% bringing it to school daily. Most parents allow this for safety and communication purposes, along with the phone being used for other services such as ordering and paying for goods. The survey revealed mixed opinions on phone use during school hours, with 68% believing that phones are necessary at school, 18% indicating that they are not necessary but are useful, and 14% considering phones totally unnecessary at school.

In relation to the school's current approach and policy towards phone use, 67% were supportive of the current approach, 24% wanted stricter controls and 9% wanted a more relaxed approach. There were a number of respondents who commented that stricter controls while at school would be beneficial in order minimise distractions and foster social interaction. Some parents raised concerns in relation to phone addiction. 81% of respondents supported confiscation for misuse of phones during school for a period of time up to the end of the day.

The SLT has discussed the findings with the Heads of Faculty and Heads of Houses, and read the latest research on the subject. The summary of these discussions is that while mobile phones have valid and practical benefits, in 2025 the school will tighten up its current policy, particularly during lessons. More details of the changes to policy will be released for the commencement of the 2025 academic year.

We look forward to the end of year camps for the Junior and Middle Division over the coming weeks, which give our students an opportunity to be active, have fun and socialise with their peers at the end of a long year. Please keep these camps in your prayers, along with our Year 4 and 6 exam students.

Reflection for the John Locke Essay Competition

I am deeply grateful to receive the Commendation award in the John Locke Essay Competition. This experience has been both rewarding and transformative, as I achieved the result I hoped for while expanding my understanding of various human knowledge. Although my examination schedule prevented me from attending the gala dinner in London, I don't see it as a loss. For me, the true reward lies in the lessons learned and the growth experienced throughout the journey.

Viola Isn't Like Us – A Film Experience

The film titled "Viola isn't like us" directed and written by June Cheong, revolves around the narrative of the main character, 15-year-old Viola, who is navigating change throughout her new school life. The film discusses relatable topics such as bullying, friendship and selfacceptance as a teen girl. Two prominent characters that contribute to Viola's experience include Jenny and Eve, who come from privileged and wealthy backgrounds. They are individuals who show aggression against Viola for being less privileged from their perspective.

Between the three main characters, I played the role of Eve, a 15-year-old girl who, with her best friend Jenny, gets fulfilment when gossiping and making fun of Viola. Throughout the film, I aspired to create a deeper character for Eve as I did not want her to just be a cliche mean girl who makes other's lives miserable because that's just what she does.

When I first got the script, I noticed the chemistry between Eve, Jenny and Viola had drastic emotional changes, highs, and lows throughout the film. Even during auditions, reading out Eve's script just felt like I had such a clear idea of a character she could have potential to be portrayed as. I spoke to the director, an incredibly talented individual, during rehearsals once. We spoke about type of girl I wanted Eve to be, and I was very clear on my aspirations of her. Eve was portrayed as a mean girl, but morally people of any character have backstories, reasons that not necessarily have to be justifications for their actions but explanations. The vulnerability in Eve struck when she accepted the help of someone she had acted negatively to since the beginning. Having harsh words thrown at you and a gossip-infused atmosphere is almost inevitable especially as a young girl.

Overall, I strove to create an empowering character for all girls and women out there despite Eve's character summary of a mean girl. Eve was someone I knew had to be mean but being downright nasty was too far from realistic. This then led me to realising Eve's lines and actions didn't have to stem from being a horrible person, she grew up privileged and maybe never had reminders to be humble or understand how to react when someone's physically different from herself. She was not a bad person, just young and immature. I also see this as a reminder not to separate oneself from others because of physical or personal differences, but to be open minded about others and what they go through. This film created a space for myself and the incredible friends and relations I made during it to strive and make the directors storyboard come to life.



HIGHER EDUCATION NEWS

In this month's newsletter, the Higher Education & Careers Department wanted to share key takeaways from a few recent university sessions the counsellors attended.

Savannah College of Art and Design, US (SCAD) offers a wide range of creative degrees, from UI/UX to animation and content creation. The SCAD campus is extensive, even featuring its own horse stables for students pursuing equestrian studies

Imperial College, St. Andrews, and University of Cambridge highlighted the importance of independent thought—no parroting or herd mentality. Admissions teams look for students who can be intellectually vulnerable, disrupt the norm, and demonstrate a deep commitment to building academic knowledge. At Cambridge, admissions tests assess a student's academic ability and potential to specialise in their degree within a short 3-4 year timeframe. Medicine applicants should be ready for situational questions like how to make a toaster more energy efficient if it uses so much energy. Students have to answer such questions verbally.

During Oxbridge interviews, students should expect to engage in discussions with two or three interviewers, apply existing knowledge to new problems, and be ready to discuss the vocational aspects of their course. These interviews test not just academic ability, but also a student's passion and single-mindedness for their chosen field.

University of Calgary is known for its focus on innovation and offers a variety of undergraduate and graduate programs across disciplines such as engineering, health sciences, and business. Calgary's vibrant campus life and its location near the Rocky Mountains provide students with a unique balance of academics and outdoor experiences. For students interested in studying in Canada, Calgary is a great option, combining academic excellence with an active lifestyle.

From **NTU**, the introduction of the ASEAN Fees Scheme was announced, offering greater financial support for regional students. Over 50% of admissions were made through the Aptitude-Based Admission route, recognizing talent beyond just grades.

Finally, discussions with **US universities such as Brown**, **Penn**, **and Columbia** emphasised the importance of holistic admissions. Schools are looking for more than just high grades—they seek students who reflect on their experiences, contribute to their communities, and align with the school's values. Each candidate's context matters more than any fixed formula, and holistic admissions build a balanced class. At NUS, the Pharmacy and Pharmaceutical Science degrees cater to different strengths and interests. Both programmes encourage students to play to their curiosity, with the option to learn another language. Pharmacy graduates are trained as clinicians with a focus on patient care, while Pharmaceutical Science graduates are more research-driven, becoming scientists. Pharmacists have strong career prospects in pharma, biopharma, and health regulatory roles, and some even pursue Medicine at Duke-NUS. In Singapore, there are currently more job openings than pharmacists, highlighting the growing need for more professionals in this field. Both Medicine and Pharmacy are clinical careers, but they differ in focus. Pharmacists are drug experts, with deeper knowledge in this area, making it a good fit for those with a strong interest in science. Medicine, being broader and diagnostic in nature, is more suitable for those interested in patient care and examination. Pharmacists are not involved in patient examination but play a crucial role in drug expertise and healthcare management.
